UNIVERSITY OF SAINT JOSEPH

The University of Saint Joseph was created in Macao in 1996 by the Catholic Foundation for Higher Education (owned in equal parts by the Diocese of Macao and *Universidade Católica Portuguesa*) with the aim of setting up a Catholic University in Macao, closely following the model and standards of top European universities.

The University follows an honourable and long history of Catholic tertiary education in Macao, initiated in the late 16th Century by Fr. Alessandro Valignano, founder of the University College of Saint Paul, to facilitate culture interchange between East and West.

What We Offer

The University offers a wide range of programmes across different fields of knowledge and all are available in detail in the University's [website](#).

The Macao Government accredits all our programmes, and our graduates have been able to pursue career and further study opportunities with local and international institutions, thus endowing us with a high level of recognition and credibility. Aside from the academic programmes, being a student at USJ is an enriching and comprehensive experience that enables the development of multiple skills and interests.

In order to help our students achieve the standards we set for them, ample academic, scientific and personal resources, including tutorials, mentoring, and counselling, are provided.

Aside from the specialised classes that students must take in each programme, our undergraduate programmes have the following characteristics:

- All undergraduate students are required to take a set of core modules. These core modules are interdisciplinary courses, where students from different programmes research, understand and critique major trends, theories and complex issues that affect our daily lives.
- A higher education degree is increasingly indispensable for a fulfilling career and successful future. The University's Office for Student and Alumni Affairs (OSAA) assists graduating students in planning, starting and developing their careers, through a range of seminars (e.g., CV-writing, interview skills), an annual career fair, as well as talks and workshops by potential employers, recruitment agencies, high-profile professionals, public workers and business people. Incoming exchange students are welcome for consultation, however incoming exchange students cannot be placed in any work or internship positions unless they satisfy Macao's labour regulations.



International University

USJ truly offers a multicultural environment to its students and is one of the most attractive destinations in Macao for students looking to enhance their knowledge and experience. USJ's academic year consists of two semesters: the Fall Semester, with classes starting in September; and the Spring Semester, with classes starting in late January/early February. The number of foreign students coming to study at our University each semester grows yearly and we have welcomed more than 50 nationalities from all corners of the world!

This exposure to different cultures also comes with the opportunity to learn different languages:

- All classes and University communications are in English.
- Additionally, students must study Mandarin, the most widely spoken language in the world, and Portuguese, another of the most popular languages in the World and the native language of over 200 million people. Portuguese is also an increasingly important language for diplomacy and business in China as some Portuguese-speaking Countries, most notably Brazil and Angola, are key trading partners of China.



EXCHANGE STUDENT OPERATIONS

USJ's CPRO has been developing and expanding partnerships with premier institutions around the world to expand our global network and further develop international cooperation, benefitting students, faculty members and staff. CPRO is USJ's point of contact with partner institutions and responsible for the operations of the exchange student programme before students arrive and after students depart Macao, while liaising with partners and local associations with international ties.

OSAA, besides holding student orientation activities, welcomes exchange students with a variety of services and support, like the organisation of cultural activities where local students and incoming exchange students can meet, socialise and learn about each other's cultures.

ADMISSION INFORMATION

Applicants must be currently enrolled at partner institutions with which USJ has an active agreement of cooperation that allows for student exchange. Each academic year, incoming exchange students are admitted

either for the Fall Semester, the Spring Semester or for one full academic year. Students can be accepted into any academic programme offered at USJ, pending on the Programme Coordinator's final consideration.

Nomination by the Home Institution

- For Fall Semester: 1st – 30th of May
- For Spring Semester: 1st – 30th of October

This nomination can be done via email and should include the following for each of the nominated students:

- Nomination email/letter by the International Affairs Office (or equivalent) of the Home Institution;
- Scanned copy of the passport (ID page);
- Scanned copy of the Transcript of Records; and
- Email, telephone number, programme of studies and intended mobility period.

Online Application by The Student

After CPRO confirms the reception of the Home Institution's nomination, we will send an email with instructions to the nominee, namely that they should prepare the following documents for the online application:

- Transcript of Records;
- Passport/Macao ID copy with an expiry date of more than six months after the end of the exchange period;
- Recent passport-size photo (1.5-inch full-face on a white background, in electronic format – TIFF, JPEG, PNG);
- USJ Health Certificate Form (provided by CPRO), with a section to be completed by a registered physician and that certifies the minimum vaccination requirements [as issued by the Macao Government](#)*:
 - Measles-containing vaccine (≥ 2 doses);
 - Rubella-containing vaccine (≥ 1 dose);
 - Tetanus-containing vaccine (≥ 3 doses – each at least 4 weeks apart, and the most recent within the past ten years);
 - Diphtheria and pertussis-containing vaccine (≥ 1 dose);
 - *Students from Pakistan, Nigeria and Afghanistan: Poliomyelitis-containing vaccine (≥ 4 doses – each at least 4 weeks apart);*
- Motivation Letter in support of the application to participate in the USJ Exchange Programme.

Note: *The documents must be properly scanned (not pictures) and in one of the following languages: English, Portuguese or Chinese. Please note the original documents must be presented during matriculation upon the student's arrival.*

After having all required documents ready, nominated students should then finalise their online application through the provided link.

Once the application is submitted, an email will be automatically sent for confirmation. Should no email be received within 24 hours after applying, students should contact CPRO at exchange@usj.edu.mo or +853 8592 5645.

The CPRO team will then review the student's application and more information will be provided to the student in due course.

International Medical Insurance (Mandatory)

In addition to students' personal insurance, all incoming exchange students are required to purchase a "Comprehensive Medical Insurance Plan" with full coverage of their intended stay in Macao. If a student considers exploring other destinations in the region, other than Macao, health insurance must provide coverage for these additional destinations. Similarly, please be reminded to check if the selected medical insurance package covers the incidence of COVID-19 (medical observation, medical tests, hospitalisation, etc.).

Exchange students are responsible for the cost of treatment during their stay in Macao. Therefore, should any medical emergencies arise, they must have medical insurance coverage as a requirement and verify that the insurance policy they carry covers hospitalisation and medical care that occur during international travel, as well as repatriation to students' home country in case of medical emergency.

Incoming exchange students must present the original medical insurance policy document during matriculation upon arrival (in English, Portuguese or Chinese).

Note: *If you have an allergic condition, it would be best to bring your medication with you and, if required, a doctor's prescription for additional medication. Additionally, should you opt to stay at the USJ Residential Hall, you must disclose any allergies and/or conditions you may have to the staff.*

Language Requirements

USJ uses the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (hereafter CEFR). Thus, all accepted incoming exchange students must demonstrate proficient command of English at a B2 level.

Fees for Incoming Exchange Students

Exchange students from any of USJ designated exchange partner institutions do not incur in USJ tuition fees nor administrative application charges or others, if mentioned in the partner agreement.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

Teaching & Learning

- A variety of learning methods and activities are used to cater to various learning styles. Consequently, lectures range from research-workshops, seminars and project-based work to activity-based learning ("learning by doing") and collaborative learning.
- Emphasis is placed on active, interactive, collaborative and concept-based learning in the course. Lectures are complemented by research activities and practical application of the material studied. Students are deliberately provided opportunities to exchange ideas and readings that will ultimately contribute towards their clarification and practical application. These learning strategies break the familiar pattern based solely on theory, focusing also on its practicality.
- By having the opportunity of interacting with different discussion groups during parts of the course, students benefit from a greater awareness of different points of view, as well as of insights and contributions regarding relevant issues.
- Assessment methods in each module vary and are frequent so that all students have the opportunity to show their strengths and receive timely feedback from the teacher.

Student Representation & Involvement

Students' views are taken very seriously and there are formal and informal ways of sharing them, like reaching out to a Professor or the Programme Coordinator. Feedback from students is similarly obtained in two other ways. Firstly, student evaluations are routinely undertaken at the end of each module. This happens through a link that students can find in their ["MyUSJ"](#) platform shortly before the module finishes, where they can rate the instructor and send module feedback. Secondly, students are asked to write course evaluations of the whole programme for the purpose of monitoring and improving the services provided.

Transcripts

The transcript is issued by the Academic Affairs Office and comprises the complete student academic record of courses taken at USJ and the respective Grade Point Average (GPA).

A transcript is issued to each incoming exchange student when they complete the programme. The original transcript will be sent to the International Relations Office (or equivalent) of the student's Home Institution. The student copy can be printed directly from ["MyUSJ"](#).

Student Card

Incoming exchange students will have a USJ Student Card issued. Besides functioning as a student ID, it can be used for borrowing books at the USJ library, and also for the following:

- Applying for student visa,
- Applying for MacauPass,
- Applying for tourist visa to Mainland China,
- Student discounts available in the city and while travelling.

Note: *Students need to report to the Academic Affairs Office if the card is lost as there is a fee for the student card replacement. Please refer to the "[USJ Student Handbook](#)" for more information.*

Personal Data Amendment

Once in Macao, incoming exchange students are expected to provide their most up-to-date contact information to the University such as their address, telephone number(s), etc. Please notify the Academic Affairs Office – Academic Records at acadrecords@usj.edu.mo.

Class Registration

Registration for modules should be done **in person and before the semester starts**, thus we strongly recommend exchange students to arrive at least one to two weeks before classes begin.

Note: *Please be prepared to be flexible with the module selection as we cannot guarantee enrolment in any specific module.*

Workload Per Semester

This is according to the requirements set-forth by the home institution. Incoming exchange students are entitled to the selection of courses according to their needs but must bear in mind that schedule overlap may occur when choosing modules of different course years and/or courses.

Incoming exchange students can enroll in up to 22 USJ credits (one USJ credit equals 15 hours of lectures) each semester. By limiting the amount to 22 credits, incoming exchange students are allowed time to experience living like a Macao local and to appreciate Macao's rich culture. However, the student should ultimately follow the home University's guidelines, as they are the entity that will grant them module equivalence.

Adding or Swapping a Module

The service to add and/or swap modules will be available up to three days before the respective class starts. During the orientation, students will get information on how to register for courses. Incoming exchange students may add or swap modules to their normal schedule.

Study Period Extension

Incoming exchange students are encouraged to complete their studies within the chosen mobility period; however, the study period may be extended up to one academic year with prior approval from their Home Institution and subsequent confirmation by USJ.

The International Relations Office (or equivalent) of the student's Home Institution should send a formal email or letter to CPRO for deliberation. Approval will be granted on a case-by-case basis and only if sufficient justification is given.

Exchange Programme Withdrawal

Exchange students wishing to withdraw from the programme while at USJ are required to inform their Home Institution and a confirmation email or letter should be addressed to CPRO for further handling.

Exchange Students' Status at USJ

Incoming exchange students will be registered at USJ as full-time non-degree students. All incoming exchange students are eligible to have the same services and facilities as the local and international full-time degree students, like access to the library and other educational or research facilities, for example. They are also entitled to participate in different University clubs during the exchange period.

Assessment Strategies

Incoming exchange students will be deliberately introduced to a range of assessment strategies during their studies. As examples, these can include: course work, individual and group presentations, individual and group projects, examinations, debates, class participation, essays, seminar papers, and other assignments. For more information, please refer to "[USJ Student Handbook](#)".

Satisfactory attendance and punctuality are also requirements for students to be eligible for assessment. Incoming exchange students whose attendance does not meet the USJ requirements for attendance and punctuality will be sanctioned unless arrangements have been made between the home institution and USJ.

The Grading System

The grades will be submitted through "[MyUSJ](#)" within one month of the last session or exam date. The module is graded on a numerical scale ranging from 0 to 20, where 10 or above is considered a "pass".

Incoming exchange students may use the Post Offices located in the city to send mail or faxes. Incoming exchange students can also receive mail, including parcels and courier packages, directly at their University apartment should they choose to live at the USJ Residential Hall. Staff members are happy to sign, on behalf of the residents, for their courier packages, and residents will be notified by email in case they receive mail. Macao postal service is considerably efficient and express services are also available for a quicker delivery with premium pricing. The express companies in Macao include EMS, DHL, FEDEX, and UPS.

Macao Visa

Incoming exchange students must ensure they have a valid passport before entering Macao.

If students transit in other regions, for example in Mainland China or Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR), they should consider if additional visas are needed ([Mainland China; HKSAR](#)).

Reaching Macao...

...By Air: Macao's International Airport is a busy one, offering flights to and from several popular locations in Asia including Japan, Indonesia, Thailand, India and more. More information [here](#).

...By Sea: Macao's Ferry terminal offers ferry rides to and from Mainland China, Central Hong Kong and Hong Kong International Airport. More information [here](#).

...By Land/Bridge: Macao borders with Mainland China's Zhuhai and its border operates from the early morning to midnight, seven days a week, making the crossing a viable option. Additionally, thanks to the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macau bridge, the longest sea crossing in the world, a new option by bus is available 24h. More information [here](#).

STUDENT VISA IN MACAO

Once the USJ administrative formalities are completed, it is time to apply for the student visa!

The "Special Authorization to Stay" for Non-Resident Students is a free-of-charge service that requires the following documents (as can be seen in Macau's Public Security Police Force website [here](#)) be submitted directly to the Macau Immigration Department*:

- A completed application form for the "Special Authorization to Stay" request (that you can download [here](#));
- Documents certifying enrolment at USJ and stating the programme duration**;
- A recent 1.5-inch, full-face, no-hat, white-background, coloured or black-and-white picture of yourself;
- A copy of your valid passport/travel document (bio data page only), and the Arrival Card for the latest entry in Macao.

* The Macau Immigration Department is open from Mondays to Thursdays from 9AM to 5:45PM and Fridays from 9AM to 5:30PM; it is closed during government holidays.

The Immigration Department's Foreigners Subdivision is located at the Travessa 1 do Cais de Pac On, in Taipa. Should you have any questions please email them directly at sminfo@fsm.gov.mo.

** You should request the declaration for the Immigration Department at the Academic Affairs Office – Academic Records (acadrecords@usj.edu.mo) by filling out a request form at USJ's Main Office (G/F of the Academic Building). The declaration certifying your course registration/enrolment and specifying the total programme duration will be issued within 3 working days.

Once the Macau Immigration Department has processed your visa application, they will issue a receipt in English. Students must bring this receipt whenever they leave and enter Macau until their "Special Authorization to Stay" is granted. The whole process takes about 30 days but you can track its progress [here](#).

By Bus: There are bus stops near USJ (the closest ones are M24 "Cons. Borja / Colégio S. José" and, on the opposite side of the road, M25 "Ilha Verde / S.A.A.M") with the following routes available: 8, 8A, 23, 28B, 28BX, H2. Each bus ride will usually cost MOP6.00, and it will be cheaper if students have a MacauPass bus card as the fee is reduced to 50% of the original.

By Taxi: The flag-fall charge of Macao's taxi is MOP19.00 for the first 1,600 meters, with MOP2.00 added for every 240 meters thereafter.

On Foot: As Macao is a relatively small city, many locations are within walkable distance. It should take only 15 to 45 minutes to get to USJ if you are within the Macao Peninsula.

COST OF LIVING

It is difficult to provide a precise estimate of the likely living costs because it varies from one person to another. Individual circumstances will determine individual costs while studying abroad. As a general rule, however, a minimum of MOP4,500 (approximately USD\$560 or EUR\$470) per month should be sufficient to cover meals, transportation, utilities (gas, electricity, water) and other living expenses. This amount does not include accommodation fees.

ACCOMMODATION

Accepted students may apply for accommodation at the **USJ Residential Hall**, managed by USJ staff. All the rooms are furnished with the essentials (for example, bed, desk and closet), and equipped with air conditioning and wireless Internet. Cleaning service of the common areas is provided on a regular basis. Rooms are limited and requests are processed on a first come first served basis.

There are different options available to pay the residence fees, either using a direct bank account transfer, or by bank cheque, bank draft, credit card or cash.

ACTIVITIES & COMPETITIONS

USJ has many activities that assist students in their personal and professional development. These range from internal activities like singing competitions and debates; to regional and international competitions, such as those related to sports. Heritage and Social Responsibility

USJ students and staff also participate in activities that honor Macao's heritage, such as dragon boat competitions, and events that are congruent with USJ's commitment to social responsibility, like the "Walk for a Million" charity walk, charity donations and visits to associations.

MACAO SPECIAL ADMINISTRATIVE REGION

The fishermen of Fujian and farmers of Guangdong were the first known to have settled in Macao. At that time, the area was known as "OuMun", or "trade door" due to its location at the mouth of the Pearl River, downstream from Guangzhou (Canton). Centuries ago this port city was on the famous Silk Route, from where boats would load silk and sail all the way to Rome.

Even after China ceased to be a centre for global trade, Guangzhou continued to thrive through maritime trade with Southeast Asian countries and the local entrepreneurs welcomed the arrival of the Portuguese explorers and merchants. They followed in the wake of Jorge Álvares, who docked in southern China in 1513 and set about to find suitable trading posts.

In the early 1550's, the Portuguese reached "OuMun" which the locals also called "A Ma Gao" ("place of A Ma"), in honor of the Goddess of the Sea and Protector of Seafarers, whose temple stood at the entrance of the sheltered Inner Harbor. The Portuguese adopted the name, which gradually changed into the name "Macao" ("Macao" in English) and, with the permission of Guangdong's Mandarins, established a city that, within a short time, became a major platform for trade between China, Japan, India and Europe.

Nowadays, Macao (in Traditional Chinese “澳門”) is one of the two Special Administrative Regions of the People's Republic of China, the other being Hong Kong. Macao lies on the western side of the Pearl River Delta, across from Hong Kong to the east, bordered by Guangdong province to the north and facing the South China Sea to the east and south. The territory's economy is heavily dependent on gambling and tourism, but also manufacturing.

Macao benefits from the principle of “one country, two systems”. The tiny SAR is growing in size – with more buildings on reclaimed land – and in the number and diversity of its attractions. The greatest of these continues to be Macao’s unique society, with communities from the East and West complementing each other, and the many people who come to visit.

Population

At the end of 2019, Macao registered over 679,000 residents. The majority is of Chinese ethnicity, with Portuguese, Filipino, Vietnamese, Indonesian and other nationalities making up the rest of the population. It is one of the most densely populated places in the world. In 2019, there were 20,400 people per km² – keep in mind Macao only has 32.9 km² in total!

Language

The official languages in Macao are Chinese and Portuguese. In everyday life, most people speak Cantonese (a dialect of Chinese), few speak Portuguese and an increasing number speak Mandarin. An English speaker can get by in Macao as some local people are able to speak English but learning common expressions, such as numbers, names of places and food in Cantonese allows for a better interaction with locals in general.

Electricity

Electricity in Macao is at 220V, 50Hz. The power plugs used in Macao are of the three-pin, square-shaped or round-shaped type, so it is suggested that you check the electrical outlet before using any electrical appliance.

Health & Medical Treatment

Vaccination certificates are required only in exceptional circumstances, in Macao, through the Region, or anywhere where vaccinations are needed. Should a medical emergency occur, please contact the following hospitals with 24 hour-emergency services:

In less urgent cases, students can go to a Macao Health Centre. The most central one is the Tap Seac Health Centre (塔石衛生中心; telephone number 2852 2232), located between Rua do Campo and Av. Conselheiro Ferreira de Almeida (荷蘭園正街).

The closest health centre to the Ilha Verde Campus is the Ilha Verde Health Centre (青洲衛生中心; telephone number 2831 0033), located in the G/F of the Cheng I building in Rua Nova da Ilha Verde (澳門青洲新街青怡大廈第一座地下).

Additionally, the closest “Farmácia Popular” to campus is located in the G/F of the Av. de Venceslau de Morais, Edifício Lei Tak Kok, “C” (慕拉士大馬路利德閣地下 C 舖).

Climate

Macao has a warm tropical climate with an annual average temperature of just over 20°C. The temperature can rise over 35°C in summer and drop below 10°C in winter. Temperatures can suddenly drop during the winter season. Humidity is high with an average value ranging from 73% to 90%. The annual heaviest rainfall happens during the summer months, thus, the best season is usually autumn (October - December), when days are sunny and warm, humidity is low and the temperature is around 16°C. Winter (January – March) is cold but sunny, with temperatures around 10°C. Humidity starts to build up and from May to September, and in April the temperature is usually around 30° – 34°C.

Typhoon: Natural weather disaster in Macao. A typhoon (also known as a “hurricane” in the Atlantic and Northeast Pacific) is a mature tropical cyclone, with strong blowing wind and with a great potential for destruction. When one is approaching the city, the Macao Meteorological and Geophysical Bureau updates people, on a daily basis, about the weather through text messages, television news bulletins, and the government’s official website [here](#)). Typhoons range from signal 1, to 3, to 8 and above, depending on its distance and strength. Although it is unusual to have typhoons with a rating of over 8, preventive action has been taken both in structure and services. The University suspends all activities during these situations.

From typhoon signal 8 upwards, people are advised to stay indoors and take safety precautions. Similarly, ferry services to and from Hong Kong are suspended.

Telecommunications

Macao’s area code is “853”. Easy call cards (prepaid phone cards) allow you to make local and long-distance calls on public phones. Mobile phones are popular in Macao and run on a GSM system. You may purchase pre-paid GSM cards or subscribe to service plans (a deposit is required for non-Macao residents) at the main four telecommunication companies in Macao. There are many types of cards with different features such as long-distance calls, internet connection, etc., so students should make sure to do some research before buying theirs.

Internet Service in Macao

Macao uses fiber broadband, making the Internet relatively cheap and fast. All the University campuses and University apartments have free Wi-Fi for students. The access code can be obtained at the University Library. There are also some hot spot areas for wireless Internet service in Macao, where you can get Internet service free of charge. An example of this service is WiFi GO, a free service provided by the Macao government.

Security in Macao

Macao is a safe place. Students can find CCTV (monitoring cameras) in all public places. Public transportation companies (including taxi and bus companies) communicate with Macao police, in case of an emergency. Most residential buildings have in-house lock and open systems too, so foreigners in Macao generally feel safe. Should students be at a security risk, they should immediately dial “999” and they will have immediate police attention.

In Macao, there usually is a police officer near you within 10 minutes. However, cases of theft and pickpocketing can occur inside public buses or crowded areas so some precaution is advised. Please note that if students forget anything inside a taxi, it is extremely unlikely that they will be able to retrieve it, so it is encouraged that students pay attention to the taxi identification number in case of any disputes – this advice is also pertinent for taxi rides abroad.

Immigration Checks Inside Macao

Macao law authorises the police to stop any foreigner at any time and place to check his/her visa status. Foreign students are advised to **always** have their student identification card (ID) or copies of their passport ID page and visa page. Without proof of legal entry, the police are authorised to arrest and detain the student until someone can provide identification.

Local Transportation

Bus

In Macao, visitors will find efficient bus services, not only in the city but also in the islands. Visitors can look for the destinations and itineraries in every bus stop’s information panels in Chinese, Portuguese and English. All buses have air-conditioning and most of the bigger buses are accessible for disabled passengers.

Taxis

The flag fall charge is MOP\$19.00. Waiting on a passengers’ request will be charged by the minute. There is also a radio-taxi service, which you can order by calling one of the following phone numbers: (+853) 2881 2345, (+853) 8500 0000, and (+853) 2828 3283.

Currency

“Pataca” (“MOP”; one is composed of 100 “avos”) is the official unit of currency in Macao. It is pegged by the government to the Hong Kong dollar (“HKD”), which circulates freely in Macao at the rate of MOP \$103 = HKD \$100. It has an estimated exchange rate of MOP \$8 = USD \$1 or MOP \$10 = EURO \$1. The bank notes and coins are in the following denominations:

In Macao shops and supermarkets, MOP and HKD are used interchangeably (MOP \$1 = HKD \$1). Some major supermarkets also accept the Chinese Yuan (CNY) at the same rate (MOP \$1 = CNY \$1).

Upon arrival, incoming exchange students may either change their USD traveler cheque into Hong Kong dollars (HKD) but a maximum of USD300 should be considered for expenses per day and a fee of MOP\$50/USD\$6/EURO\$5 will be charged per transaction. We advise students to use their VISA cards to get cash directly from the bank and also to bring a certain amount in USD or EURO to exchange in the bank without any service fee(s) or limited amount.

There are also other sub-regional and local banks in Macao. Foreign students can get details for possible linking of their local global bank accounts with a Macao branch directly from the chosen bank's website.

Note: Some banks may be unable to open a new bank account for an exchange student because of the short duration of stay in Macao. The banks in Macao, according to the Macao monetary authority, are instructed to open a bank according to the customer's visa status.

Other Financial Services

Other financial services companies in Macao, like Western Union Money Transfer, are available in Macao. This might be helpful in case the student needs to receive a relatively small amount of money from a sender in their home country. Please note that Paypal is **not available** in Macao, but services like MPay, Alipay and WeChat pay are available in several supermarkets and shops.

Currency Exchange

There are several shops and companies, like the banks mentioned above, that offer instant over-the-counter currency exchange services and they are located all throughout Macao.

Some kiosks at the Macau airport and other places more frequented by tourists have a large margin between their buy and sell rates so it is best if students have an idea of the usual exchange rate before doing so as to not be misled.

Shopping

The main shopping areas of Macao include the “Avenida de Horta e Costa” area and the “Leal Senado”/”Rua do Campo” areas. Between the island of Taipa and Coloane you can find the Cotai strip, where hotels like The Venetian and Sands Cotai Central, to name a few, have all sorts of shops inside.

For your daily life, however, convenience stores, supermarkets and discount stores are extremely important facilities and so we have listed below some you may want to become familiar with.
